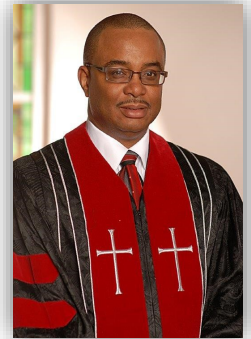

THESE WOMEN ARE NOT BEHIND BARS BUT ARE IN PRISON!!



Kairos Outside NYC, chartered in 2009, is the local chapter of Kairos Prison Ministry International. Mass Incarceration, is defined in the New Jim Crow. *From 1970 to 2005 the number of inmates increased 700%. The U.S. has the highest incarceration rate in the world.* This Ministry is designed for women impacted by incarceration. Someone in their life is or was in prison. In many ways the families are “doing time” right along with the incarcerated. This ministry is also for women that were previously incarcerated.

JoAnne Edwards, Sharon Gilham, Yvonne Harris, Crystal Murray, Janice Robinson, Dr. Frozine Reece-Smith, and Stephanie Ward are members of Bethel Baptist Church and this Ministry. Each year Kairos Outside NYC offers two Weekends (Friday-Sunday) for women. These women referred to as “Guests” have an opportunity to get to know others that share similar struggles and concerns. The next Weekend will take place May 15-17, 2020. The goal of this ministry is to provide a loving, safe and supportive environment, while addressing the Guest’s spiritual needs.

Members of Bethel Baptist Church supported this ministry helping to make a memorable experience for Guests that attended the November Weekend. Pastor Williamson, Wallace McGiver, Henry Mills, Lloyd Scrub, Leonard Hadley, David Coleman and Leonard Johnson supported this ministry by loading and unloading supplies for that Weekend. Kairos refers to those that assist and volunteer their time as “Angels”.

It cost approximately \$15,000 to carry out these Weekends. *ALL expenses are covered by donations, Guests do not pay a fee. On two separate occasions, we were blessed with the presence of Assistant District Attorney Susan Brownbill-Vega and Assistant District Attorney Emily Rowe-Smith. The topic of discussion “Internet Safety” sounded alarms for adults as well as our youth. In the adult seminar, we discussed topics pertaining to things that could get you as an adult in trouble. You must be mindful of all pictures and videos that are posted, personal information being disclosed, as well as what you think is deleted is not gone. There is someone, somewhere reading ALL that you feel is being kept confidential. We also discussed if you are the primary for your phone lines and there are inappropriate things found on an electronic device attached to you, the police can



trace it back to you and the primary could possibly be held accountable. As an adult, it is important to know the different Application Software (Apps) that are circulating and their intended purpose of use. Sit down with your young person and ask questions. Make sure you *Get in the Know!!*

In the youth seminar, we discussed setting up apps or games on devices and having an older adult with you. People are not always who they say they are. The young people were told to never give out personal information and if something does not seem right tell an adult immediately. Do not use your device to bring harm to others in any type of way. Most of all we learned that *an electronic device with internet capabilities is not necessarily a bad thing, it is all about what and how you use it. Make your electronic device work for you and help you to become a better and smarter person!!*

Join The Dfree Movement: Say Yes To No Debt

Pastor Williamson and Bro. Michael Young

Below are some excerpts and insights from Bro. Michael Young after he read the book, *Say Yes to No Debt* by Rev. Dr. Deforest Soaries, Jr. Dr. Soaries is the Senior Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Lincoln Gardens in Somerset, NJ. I had the opportunity to meet Dr. Soaries several years ago when he presented the dfree program and philosophy at the Lott Carey Convention. In Dr. Soaries' words consumer debt is a new form of slavery. He states,

“Consumer debt grips millions of people with plastic shackles every bit as powerful as the iron chains that once bound slaves. A bold, even audacious, statement, I know, particularly considering the historical atrocities of slavery in our country. As a descendant of some of those slaves, I do not make this analogy without recognizing the gravity of its implications. I do not make such a comparison lightly or for the sheer effect of its cultural shock value, although the ongoing enslavement of millions of Americans should shock and concern all of us. While many of my fellow African Americans may be particularly upset or offended by my literal comparison, I find that enslavement is the only adequate word to express the dire, life-draining, debilitating condition in which we find ourselves today.”

Dr. Soaries is passionate about leading a movement that leads people toward financial freedom. Freedom is our emphasis for the month of February. We want to challenge people to learn principles and practices that lead to liberation from the chains of consumer debt and other forms of financial bondage. Beginning this month we hope to take the initial steps to begin a new ministry that will link members of our congregation and community with this liberating movement. Say Yes to No Debt


Editorial Comments and Insights from Bro. Michael Young

The book *Say Yes to No Debt* by Rev. Deforest Soaries is well written and an easy read. I must say that this is the fastest I have ever read a book. This goes to the timeliness and relevance of the topic. You can tell how deeply Rev. Soaries believes in the program as it is referred to as a “movement.” He also wants to take this movement to as many churches and community organizations as possible. I think many members of Bethel can benefit from the information in this book. But it is not just the relevance of the book that can help the Bethel family. The methods and practices described within give ways to implement a debt free lifestyle. That alone can be helpful to us. Moreover, if done well, the methods of the program can provide us with, as the author states, “an evangelistic outreach in order to connect with community members outside the church.”

The dfree program as presented in the book is a very comprehensive program. It has four levels and twelve steps. It starts with

how to help people that are in deep financial trouble including consumer debt and delinquency. It ends with how to train people to teach the dfree methods and practices. We would be able to modify the model to fit our specific needs. Dfree Ministries provides resources and assistance for those that would like to participate in the movement. Our initial steps will be to identify individuals in our congregation interested in the dfree ministry movement and then to establish a core group to launch the ministry. We invite you to attend the first dfree orientation sessions and classes beginning this month, February 9th, 16th, and 23rd. Other sessions will be offered in the future.

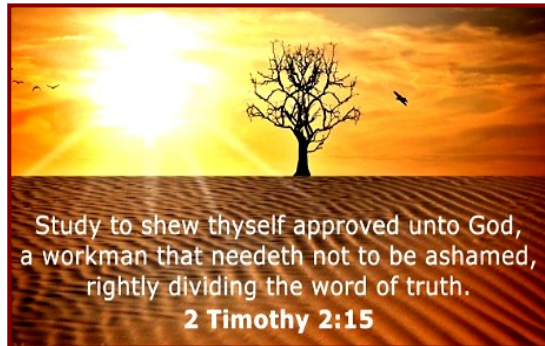

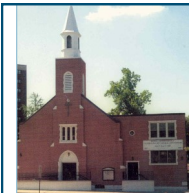
